It is with great pleasure that we celebrate with you the success of Plant the Future of Farming, a joint capital campaign with our partners at the WNY Land Conservancy!

In 2022, Providence Farm Collective and the Land Conservancy raised \$2.3 million dollars to purchase 37-acres of prime farmland on Burton Road. The property will be forever protected as agricultural land, and will be the location of a barn hub that will support PFC farmers' and the organization's educational, business, and farming needs. How did we do this? With the love and support of a community! There was no contribution too small as philanthropic organizations, civic organizations like the Junior League of Buffalo, individual donors, and corporate supporters joined together to empower just and equitable access to food and farmland.

PFC also experienced growth in 2022 with new staff additions, including Community Engagement Coordinator Dao Kamara, Administrative Coordinator Maria Guzzo, and Marketing Coordinator Hamadi Mganga. Dao shared his passion for farming and fresh foods with attendees at a luncheon tour. Maria welcomed visitors to the office while managing youth employees' timesheets. Hamadi, with the Marketing Committee, updated PFC's website to highlight the organization's growth. These individuals bring unique skills and passions to support PFC's mission of cultivating farmer-led and community-rooted agriculture and food systems to actualize the rights of under-resourced peoples.

At Providence Farm Collective, we prioritize partnership and collaboration in all that we do. 2022 was an extraordinary year of working together to build a stronger Western New York. In 2021, I joined Providence Farm Collective (PFC) as Markets Manager, supporting farmers in improving how they market and sell their produce, as well as coordinating PFC's produce aggregation for food pantries and Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) memberships. Upon joining PFC and working alongside the farmers and staff, we recognized an opportunity to address a disparity in food access. In particular, many of the communities that are part of PFC and live on the West Side of Buffalo expressed a lack of access to fresh, organic, and affordable produce within their neighborhood. The farmers indicated that starting a farmers market is an important step in addressing food insecurity and ensuring that more members of the community have access to healthy, culturally relevant food at reasonable prices while helping farmers connect to customers to sell their produce.

With support from a multi-year USDA Farmers Market Promotion Program grant to launch a PFC Farmers Market, I successfully completed a NYS Farmers Market Manager Professional Certification Program. With the efforts of the PFC farmers and team, the market was launched this summer at the M&T Bank parking lot at 130 Grant Street in the heart of Buffalo's West Side. Recognizing the gap between what customers in the neighborhood have budgeted for food and the prices PFC farmers must sell at to build economically sustainable farms, PFC applied and was able to accept SNAP/EBT and Double Up Food Bucks, plus Senior and WIC checks, at the market.

The PFC Farmers Market has been a success for both farmers and community members; farmers have been able to better connect with their community and earn increased income, while community members have had improved access to fresh, affordable, and culturally relevant food. Furthermore, at the end of each market day, PFC staff aggregated produce that was not sold during the market and donated it to food pantries thanks to support from the Buffalo Bills Foundation. The sales earned by the farmers helps support the local economy as they reinvest their income in their families and communities. The farmers and community members alike have indicated that this initiative plays a critical role in promoting food security and supporting local communities. The farmers are eager and look forward to seeing the market work to support the health and well-being of the community, and I also hope it continues to thrive!

Apart from launching the farmers market, PFC completed a capital campaign in conjunction with the Western New York Land Conservancy to raise funds to purchase the land it leases and build a new barn with wash stations, a farm store, and a commercial kitchen. With the capital campaign completed and the farmland purchased, PFC can begin implementing much-needed infrastructure upgrades to enhance efficiency and profitability to better support PFC and the farmers.

Thank you to all of those who have supported PFC this year! I look forward to seeing you at the Farmers Market in summer 2023.

On July 2nd, 2022, the farmers made a dream come true with the launch of the PFC Farmers Market at 130 Grant Street in the M&T Bank parking lot. Every Saturday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. from July 2nd through October 15th, the market brought fresh and affordable food to the diverse neighborhood, which is home to many refugee and immigrant communities. From African maize to Liberian bitter ball, the market offered a wide variety of culturally relevant foods that are often difficult to find. Not only did it benefit the local food system, it also helped increase income for our farmers. The market was such a success that many of our farmers have expressed a desire to continue and even expand it.

\$6,777 in sales by PFC farmers at the market were to low-income customers via Farmers Market Checks, Double Up Food Bucks and Tokens, and SNAP.
