Dear Providence Farm Collective Community,

On May 31, 2023, Providence Farm Collective became a farmland owner. Completing the purchase of its 37-acre home on Burton Road in Orchard Park marks the first goal of our successful joint capital campaign with the Western New York Land Conservancy. PFC's ownership and protection of this land are impactful for all of us in Western New York – not just PFC's farmers.

In Erie County, we have lost 40% of our farmland to development since 1970. Consequently, our local food production has moved farther away from our population centers. This threatens an already precarious local food system where 1 in 5 children regularly experiences food insecurity and access to healthy fresh foods is limited or nonexistent in communities of color and for many residents of our rural communities. All of us in our greater WNY community feel this impact on our neighbors.

There are many motivations for which PFC farmers grow food. Our incubator farmers are developing farm businesses. Our community farmers grow culturally important vegetables to feed their families, their community members, and others who lack access in our region. There are health benefits for you and all our PFC community members that include being in nature, connecting with the community through a shared meal under the tent, and sharing our food traditions with our kids and friends across Western New York. There is no doubt that farmland ownership has catalyzed change for PFC, its farmers, and all of us in the community. For all farmers, there is security in landownership that provides an opportunity to invest funds in needed infrastructure and improvements that can increase farmers' yields. For PFC, farmland ownership is agency to implement a holistic sustainability model that equally uplifts people, the environment, and PFC's mission, while also working toward financial sustainability. Rather than spending money to improve someone else's property, PFC funds can be invested in nurturing our soil and programs that empower farmers and eaters – benefitting all of us in Western New York. PFC farmers have a home to grow the foods they want, practice their agricultural traditions, and share both with you. There is security for all of us in owning and protecting our 37-acres on Burton Road.

As board member Rachel Tarwo so lovingly says, "PFC is our home."

Together we celebrate our food and farm traditions. Thank you for being a part of the Providence Farm Collective community!

LETTER FROM THE FIELD

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you in the best of health and spirits. In my role as Farm Mentor, I guide members of refugee and immigrant communities to bridge the gap between their farming aspirations and the realities of farming in Western New York.

In 2023, I began the journey of representing Providence Farm Collective (PFC) as a Great Lakes Regional Navigator. This American Farmland Trust program "aims to support the ecological health of the Great Lakes while sustaining a viable agricultural economy and communities." As a navigator with PFC, I focus on land access for refugee and immigrant farmers. As a Somali Bantu farmer, I understand the deep connections refugees and immigrants have to farming and food, especially when it comes to their culture and wellbeing. That is why I am dedicated to helping my fellow farmers navigate barriers to farmland access.

Some of the largest barriers PFC farmers face are language and understanding different pathways to farmland access. Many PFC farmers speak three or more languages — still, English is not our first language. I use my multilingual skills to help communicate and bring in land access experts to discuss options with farmers like cooperative organization, lease-to-own agreements, and outright purchase. I help farmers carefully weigh these options with their unique needs and goals.

Whether it's growing African corn, okra, or collards, the joy of providing fresh, cultural produce to our communities is transformative. During a Pathways to Land Access workshop, PFC farmers heard an inspiring example from Moses, a Kenyan farmer from Minnesota. Moses' journey to buy land and make it available to other incubator farmers in his community instilled hope in our farmers.

By coming together with partners, we can create a future where determined immigrant and refugee farmers are empowered with the right support for them to care for the land, grow healthy food, preserve their culture, and contribute to the local economy.

I welcome any assistance or advice you can provide as we continue to support our diverse farmers to navigate farmland access.

PROJECT SPOTLIGHT

Celebrating Agricultural Heritage Through Cyanotypes

The Cyanotypes Project reflects the strength, culture, and farming traditions of our families at Providence Farm Collective. As art bloomed in the fields, the panels we created reflect our shared bond to the soil through imagery and poetry. The project is ultimately a celebration of our community, our families, and our heritage as farmers.

Cyanotype photography, known for its characteristic blue hue, was used to capture more than just the physical likeness of our families and their crops. Photojournalist and artist Brendan Bannon created and led this project, intertwining the art of photography with the rich cultural narratives of PFC farm families. The project's power lay in its ability to merge the traditional with the contemporary, bearing witness to the essence of our farmers, their deep-rooted connection to the earth, and the plants they grow as they share their personal stories of nurturing the land in each fabric panel.

PROGRAMS: HIGHLIGHTS & PARTNERS





Incubator Farm Program

- Graduated first cohort of new farmer businesses.
- Supported in partnership with the USDA Beginner Farmers & Ranchers Programs.

Community Farm Program

- 9 community organizations accessed land and resources to provide fresh food security and culturally significant produce.
- Produce Aggregation for Food Pantries Program supported in partnership with New York Food for New York Families Grant.

Compost Program

- Launched a new composting initiative aimed at improving soil health and sustainability.
- Supported in partnership with AGCO Agriculture Foundation.

Farmer & Youth Lunch Program

- Over 10,000 meals served to farmers, youth employees, and farm visitors.
- Supported in partnership with the Blue Fund, the Buffalo Bills Foundation (commercial kitchen food trailer), and St. James United Church of Christ/ Churches in Action (new freezer).

PFC's Monday Market Stand/CSA Program

- Provided fresh, locally grown produce to 70 customers.
- 53 CSA members picked up vegetable shares at the farm every Monday for 18 weeks.
- Sponsored in partnership with Rich Products.

Summer Vibe Youth Employment Program

- 34 summer youth employees earned a combined total of \$110,000.00.
- Sponsored in partnership with Erie County Department of Social Services SYEP and Jewish Family Services, with additional workshops supported by Second Generation Theatre.


